

Advent Two: The Path of Mercy

Freedom Bound Advent – Epiphany 2015

- Why the theme "Freedom Bound" for this series?
- We live in the paradox where we are both bound and free, on a march to freedom but encumbered by the burden of sin we carry; we are carrying the scars of struggle but living with a new hope.
- Therefore, we will be reflecting on how God's coming (advent) in Jesus, whom we call the Christ, releases us from personal, social, and historical chains that bind us.
- God's freedom takes us down pathways of: justice, mercy, trust, love, service, and inclusion.

Psalm 25:1,4 NIV

- ¹ In you, LORD my God, I put my trust.
- ⁴ Show me your ways, LORD, teach me your paths.
- ⁵ Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long.

Malachi 3:1-2 NRSV / NLT

¹ See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ² But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

- ⁵ The <u>light shines in the darkness</u>, and the darkness can never extinguish it.

⁶ God sent a man, John the Baptist, ⁷ to <u>tell about the light</u> so that everyone might believe because of his testimony. ⁸ John himself was not the light; he was simply a witness to tell about the light. ⁹ The one who is <u>the true light</u>, who gives light to everyone, <u>was coming</u> into the world.

The Emerald Rainbow of God

John, Revelation 4:2-3 NRSV – Vision of God's Merciful Light

² At once I was in the spirit, and there in heaven stood a throne, with one seated on the throne! ³ And the one seated there looks like <u>jasper and carnelian</u>, and around the throne is a <u>rainbow</u> that looks like an <u>emerald</u>.

- Jasper sparkles & flashes (holiness & glory of God)
- Carnelian deep reddish, smoldering fire (wrath against sin)
- Emerald soothing green like meadows & forests
- Rainbow symbol of divine mercy (overarching all of God)

⁴⁶ Then they came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd, were leaving the city, a blind man, Bartimaeus (which means "son of Timaeus"), was sitting by the roadside begging. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!"

⁴⁸ Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"

The blind man said, "Rabbi, I want to see."


⁵² "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.
