When Christ Meets Culture

- Jesus was born into Jewish culture.
- The apostles, especially Paul, went "crossculture" to Greeks and Romans (Acts 15).
- As the Christian faith spreads, it takes on different expressions in every location.
- The Jesus movement transforms lives from within culture, and redeems what it's able.
- Culture isn't *inherently* evil. It is symptomatic of a society's beliefs, customs, traditions, etc.

Paul, Romans 12:1-2 NLT

1 And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him. 2 Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Being Salt & Light

Jesus, Matthew 5:13-16 NLT

13 "You are the salt of the earth. But what good is salt if it has lost its flavor? Can you make it salty again? It will be thrown out and trampled underfoot as worthless. 14 "You are the light of the world—like a city on a hilltop that cannot be hidden. 15 No one lights a lamp and then puts it under a basket. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where it gives light to everyone in the house. 16 In the same way, let your good deeds shine out for all to see, so that everyone will praise your heavenly Father.

2 Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. 3 And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. 4 Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. 5 Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. 6 Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone.

11 Dear friends, I warn you as "temporary residents and foreigners" to keep away from worldly desires that wage war against your very souls. 12 Be careful to live properly among your unbelieving neighbors. Then even if they accuse you of doing wrong, they will see your honorable behavior, and they will give honor to God when he judges the world.

Paul to Titus, Titus 2:11-15 NLT

11 For the grace of God has been revealed, bringing salvation to all people. 12 And we are instructed to turn from godless living and sinful pleasures. We should live in this evil world with wisdom, righteousness, and devotion to God, 13 while we look forward with hope to that wonderful day when the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ, will be revealed. 14 He gave his life to free us from every kind of sin, to cleanse us, and to make us his very own people, totally committed to doing good deeds. 15 You must teach these things and encourage the believers to do them. You have the authority to correct them when necessary, so don't let anyone disregard what you say.

Society & Culture: 3 Wrong Responses

1. Defensive Against

(legislating sin, power of the sword, boycotting, etc.) What is the danger?

2. Purity From

(withdrawal from "evil" world, save "souls" only, etc.)
What is the danger?

3. Relevant To

(relevance is *it*, decisions driven by culture, etc.)

Being a Faithful Presence

- Willing and able to "be there" to serve and make disciples within society and culture
- Infusing life and love (well-being) into the chaos of culture—shining a light into the darkness
- Maintaining a historically Christian theology and worldview as a counter-cultural community
- Promoting the Gospel of transformational inclusion into the Kingdom that always looks like Jesus laying his life down for others

"The lasting effects of these shifts will force churches to make a critical decision. They will either become a cultural church that allows the societal trends to dictate their ever-changing beliefs. Or they will become a counter-cultural church that faithfully adheres to Scripture and proclaims the gospel in a carefully considered way.
